Entrance into Greater Chicago Chess League Competition Investigated. As most of you team captains have learned by phone calls from me, we are looking into the feasibility of entering an All-League 6-man team into a 7 round team tournament of the G.C.C.L. This tournament begins in December and lasts about 8 months. If we can get 16 to 18 better players who are interested in playing in at least half of the games, I will recommend that we enter a team in our colleagues' schedule. It will give those players interested in more activity the opportunity to increase their participation in organized competition, and it will certainly help improve one's game through playing some of Chicago's best Class A and expert players. A fee of \$10 will be required to help pay for team trophies (1st place traveling and 1st place permanent). If anyone objects to using League funds for this purpose, please let me know. All names, departments and telephone extensions of members interested in playing on our composite team should be forwarded to me by November 23.

Exit Stevenson. The Lakeside Press C. C. suffered a serious blow in the loss of William P. Stevenson who has accepted a position with the Hammond Organ Co. Bill was one of the founders of the Donnelley Club and of our League. He was his team's first captain and the most frequent top board player. In 3 years of competition, Stevenson compiled a fabulous record of 18 wins (including a forfeit win), 5 draws, and 2 losses, and established himself as the League's strongest player aside from Jim Warren. Bill will be missed not only as a fine chess player but as the genial gentleman and capable leader he is.

All-League Team Response. The investigation into the interest of our League members in an All-League team to play in the Greater Chicago Chess League yielded the following interested members: Morton Hamermesh, Bruce Dieter, Bill Nyman, Ed Asmann, Jerry Biester, Nick Goncharoff, Dragi Lazarevich, Bill Greenspan, Jim Brotsos, Charlie Sechler, Tom Holder, Bob Moeller, and Jarvis Ross. No interest was shown by Western Electric or Stewart Warner. The 13 team members would be a large enough group to enter a team if each of the candidates were able to make at least half of the 6 or 7 matches involved. Ed Buerger, G.C.C.L. President, has pointed out that all of the existing teams in his League play their matches on weekends. Also G.C.C.L. rules require each team to specify a definite home location, lineup and meeting time and day of the week. Therefore additional questionnaire blanks are enclosed to determine relative interest in participation and preference in meeting time and place. Please have your team candidates fill these out and return them to me.

Hammerschmidt Scores in Big Tournament. In the 1960 North Central open chess tournament held last weekend in Milwaukee, Will Hammerschmidt, president of Western Electric's C.C., split 3-1/2 - 3-1/2 to win the unrated player's prize of \$15. One of Will's victims was ex-Wisconsin Champion Surgles. During the tournament, Will was given a tentative U.S.C.F. rating of 1950 which brings him within 50 points of Expert Class.

A contingent from Argonne also played and made a good showing as follows: Expert Angelo Sandrin (4-1/2 - 2-1/2), team captain Ed Radzitis (4 - 3), and J. Scherer (3-1/2 - 3-1/2).

It is reported that the winner of the 92 man tournament was Raymond Weinstein of New York (6 - 1) who nosed out Lajos Szedlacek of Cleveland (6 - 1) and Richard Fauber (6 - 1).

Galvin Elected President at Donnelley. Tim Galvin was elected president of the Lakeside Press Chess Club while John Harwood was chosen Sec'y-Treas. and Bob Moeller, a very capable team captain, was re-elected to that office. Good luck to these officers!
