League Players Win Class Prizes in Greater Chicago. In addition to the prizes mentioned last month which were awarded to the League players who participated in the Greater Chicago Open, the following won class prizes: Jim Sullivan of the WE Chargers tied for third prize, Class A. Walter Elliott, also of the Chargers, tied for second prize, Class B. Joe Radey and Lee Larsonneur of Johnson & Johnson tied with each other for first prize, Class C. Congratulations to all of these players.

Rules for Seven-Minute Speed Tournament. The following rules will govern the speed event to be held at our annual banquet. Clocks will be set at seven minutes before the hour. A player must make a move and punch the clock with the same hand. A player wins on time if his opponent's flag drops before his own time limit expires and the player notices it. If both flags are down before either player notices it the game is a draw. However, a game cannot be won on a time forfeit if it would be impossible (not just improbable) for the game to be won otherwise. The game is a draw if there is not enough material left on the board for either player to checkmate the other. An illegal move loses the game automatically.

Gompers All-Expert Team Wins Chicagoland Championship. Gompers Park (Team Number I) beat out eight other teams April 25 to capture the Chicagoland Team Championship. This was a five-round 30-minute game Swiss event sponsored by the Chicago Chess Foundation. Going into the final round Gompers I and the Neris (Lithuanian) Chess Club were tied in match points 4-0, but Gompers led in game points 21-20½. The final match between these teams ended in a 3-3 tie, but the game point edge gave Gompers I the championship. The highlight in the final round was Karl Panzner's key victory over Paul Tautvaisas. 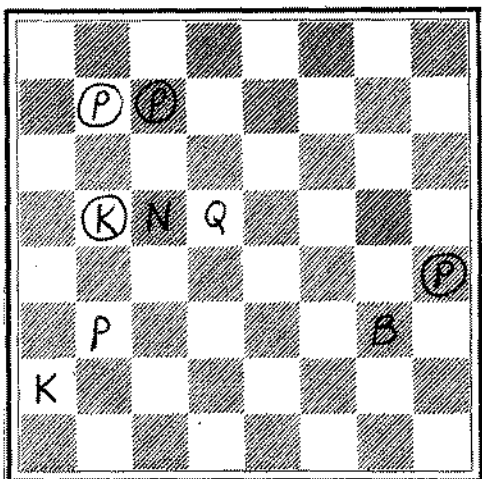

White to move and mate in three

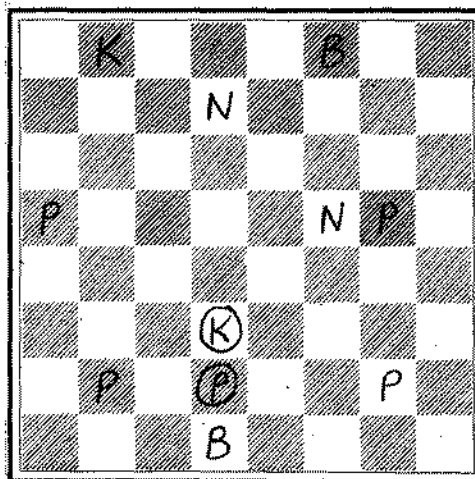
