Unsets are Rule in February, March Matches. The Western Electric Chargers widened their lead to  $1\frac{1}{2}$  match points by sinking Stewart-Warner/Sunbeam 7-1. The Argonne Pawns moved into second place by upsetting the Bishops and Knights in successive matches by identical scores of 5-3 and drawing with Motorola 4-4. The Western Electric Gambiteers overtook Motorola by winning their February match  $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$ .

Illinois Bell moved up to seventh place by edging Stewart-warner/Sunbeam  $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$  and pulling an upset draw with the Argonne Bishops  $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$ . Hall-Roto also upset the Argonne Bishops by holding them to a 4-4 tie. A strike at Goss Printers has resulted in their getting behind a couple of matches. These will be made up between now and the end of the season, if possible.

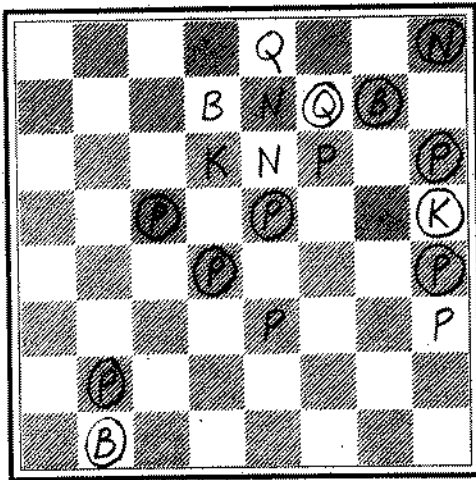

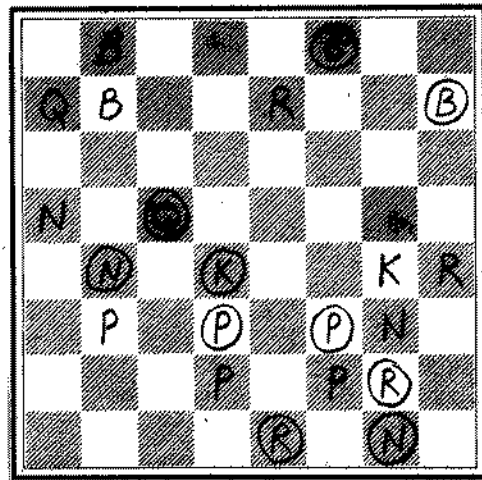
