FIDE Article 12: "DRAWN GAME:

The game is drawn:

1. When the King of the player who has the move is not in check, but such player cannot make any legal move. The King is then said to be "stalemated".
2. By agreement between the two players."

USCF Tournament Rules: 10. It is unethical and unsportsmanlike to agree to a draw before a serious contest has begun. The Director must use his discretionary power to penalize any player who repeatedly fails to respect his duty toward the tournament organizers and the chess public by agreeing to short draws.

3. Upon demand by one of the players when the same position appears three times, the same player having the move each time. The position is considered the same if men of the same kind and color occupy the same squares. The right to claim the draw belongs exclusively to the player:
 - a) who is in position to play a move leading to such repetition of the position, if he declares his intention of making such move;
 - b) who is in position to reply to a move which has produced the repeated position.

If a player makes a move without having claimed a draw in the manner prescribed in a) and b), he loses the right to claim a draw; this right is restored to him, however, if the same position appears again, the same player having the move.

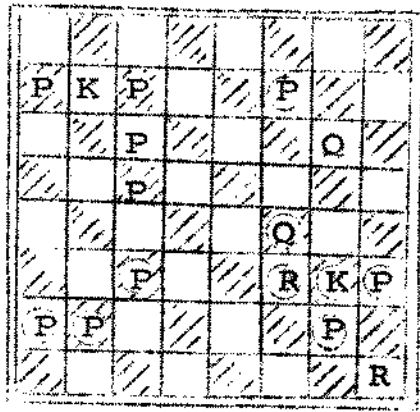
USCF Tournament Rules: 11. The procedure of claiming a draw under Article 12, Section 3, of the FIDE Laws shall be as follows:

- a) The player who is in a position to play a move producing the third repetition of the position should say, "I claim a draw," and write the move on his score sheet. The player should not make the move on the board.
 - b) The player who is in a position to reply to a move which has produced the third repetition of the position should say: "I claim a draw," but make no move on the board.
 - c) In either of the situations described in (a) and (b) above, making a move on the board must be interpreted as waiving the claim of a draw; but the right to again claim a draw is restored to the player if the same position appears again, the same player having the move.
 - d) If, in either of the situations described in (a) and (b) above, the player claims a draw and then makes a move on the board, he has waived his claim of a draw, but his opponent may accept and validate the claim, provided he does so before touching a man. If the Director is not present when the draw is claimed, he should be summoned forthwith.
4. When a player having the move demonstrates that at least fifty moves have been made by each side without the capture of any man, or the movement of any Pawns. The number of fifty moves may be increased for certain specific positions, provided that this increase in number and these positions have been clearly established prior to commencement of the game.

The position shown was reached in a rated ANL game. It was played with no other players being present. The game continued as follows:

Black claims a draw. White has the wrong impression, that the third sequence of moves, such as 43 ---- Q-N3#, 44 Q-N4 has to be completed before the game is drawn.

Since the question cannot be resolved without the Director, Black is willing to continue the game under PROTEST and marks his score sheet as such. White accepts the Protest and the game continues.

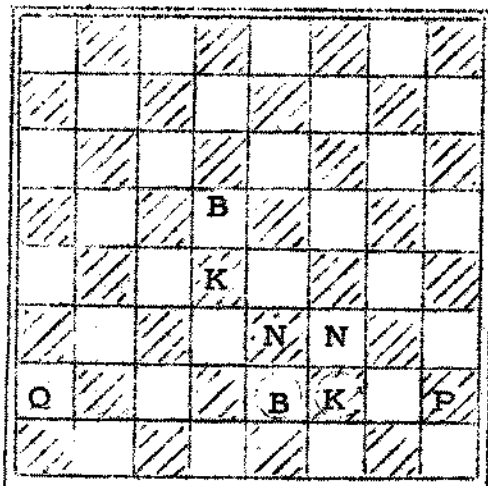

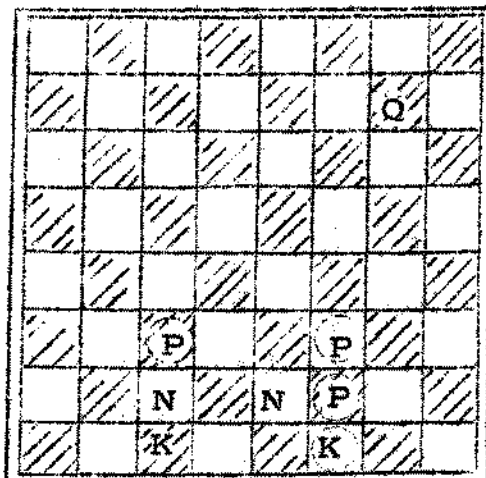
