KUMRO'S KORNER (AGAIN?)

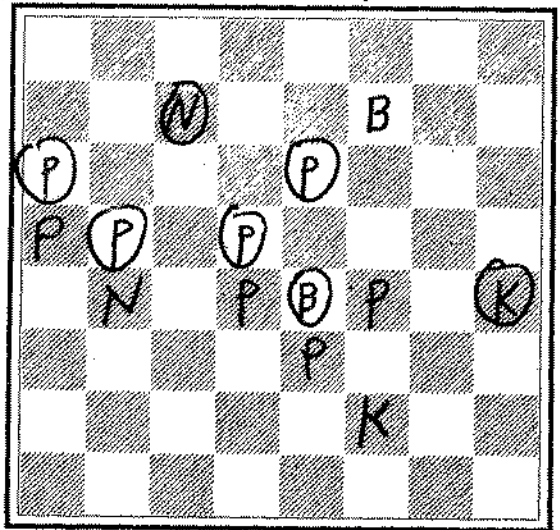

Chicago Industrial Chess League Ratings.

The pressures of business over the last seven or eight months forced me to suspend work on the rating of Industrial Chess League match games. Time should now permit me to resume and complete this project and give a full report on it before the 1968-69 season begins.

The project involves a computerized system to rate the some 3000 games played in league matches over the last nine years by over 500 players. All game results are processed by Method B described under "Rating a Group of Unrated Players" in the article "The USCF Rating System--Its Development, Theory, and Applications" by Arpad E. Elo, published in 1966.

As a result of this processing, which involves as many iterations as necessary, a set of self consistent ratings are computed. The USCF ratings of those league players who have established USCF ratings are then used to convert the set to the USCF scale. A by-product of the above is a report summarizing individual results by player.

Many thanks to Walter Elliott, Joe Neumark, Victor Puchala, Carl Lantz and Ray Fabijonas, who helped post the some 3000 league game results to data sheets for keypunching.
