

CHICAGO INDUSTRIAL CHESS LEAGUE BULLETIN

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LIN AND WARREN WIN 30-30

February 13th was a drab, snowy day - just right for staying indoors and playing chess. So 28 enthusiasts came in out of the cold and pushed wood from 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. The occasion was the League's 30-30 Swiss tournament. After 5 rounds of brilliancies, blunders, upsets and uplifts, Maung Lin and Jim Warren split the top prize money (\$21) with  $4\frac{1}{2}$  points each. Eleven others scoring at least 3 points shared in the \$67 allocated for prizes. (see crosstable)

The event was well attended enough to make it an interesting tournament, and it was gratifying to see the Junior Division enter this competition, but, at the same time, there were 15 other teams that did not send a single representative.

J. Ason of Bell Labs and Vern Stamm, President of the Hawthorne Chess Club, were interested enough to drop in to watch the matches. We owe thanks to the latter for making Albright Gym available to us for the tourney and we certainly are obliged to Frank Tegel for his work as General Chairman of the affair. It was especially nice that the Tegels provided coffee service for the group at their own expense.

The most exciting games observed by the Editor were two near-upsets in the first round. Paul Sirgedas had a won game against Nikolai Goncharoff, but lost on time in the frantic blitz portion of the game. It was noted that Paul punched his chess-box several times instead of his clock lever in the mad scramble. Steve Schwartz also managed to reach a drawn position (K & R vs. K & R) against Expert Lin, but since the tournament director had not specified this as an "automatic" draw, they played on. Lin, with an edge on the clock, won on time. Because of this incident, the writer suggests that future 30-30 rules allow for "instant adjudications" by the TD. In other words, if either player calls his attention to such an obvious drawn position, he can pronounce the game a draw, eliminating the prospect of the game degenerating into a "quick wrist" contest. MATT PAVITT PAYS A VISIT

On February 11 your President was pleasantly surprised to learn that Matthew Pavitt, President of the Commercial Chess League of New York, was in Chicago.

You readers of Chess Life & Review know that Matt is also Editor of the Industrial Chess column. In fact, the C.I.C.L. was mentioned twice in the February issue of C.L. & R. Matt corrected the order of names printed under the picture of former League Chairmen taken at last June's banquet. He also paid us a nice compliment in having the best bulletin he's seen in industrial chess organization.

Your President has corresponded with Matt for over a year and even talked with him by telephone, three times. Because he has always proven to be helpful and most interested in our activities, one could not pass up the opportunity to meet Mr. Pavitt. Because of the short notice, it was possible to invite only a handful of our League leaders to meet Matt.

Matt is a Manager of Market Research at McGraw Hill. He is a vigorous middle-aged man, heavy set, with a shock of grey hair combed straight back. His manner of speech is deliberate and distinguished.

At supper he described his interest in music, theater, ballet, sports and, of course, chess. Matt is an accomplished recorder (the wind instrument) player and not only performs with a semi-professional ensemble but was once an officer in the national association of recorder players. He was very active in hockey, softball, and baseball - a pro ball player in his youth. He still plays fast-pitch softball in an organized program of former semi-pro or college ball players.

In chess, Matt has not only been President of the C.C.L. of N.Y. for six years, but he was formerly President of the Metropolitan Chess League of N.Y. - the epitome of chess leagues in the U.S. Although he is not a member of the U.S. C.F., he is obviously interested in chess at all levels. As a player, he has a high Class B rating.

After dinner the writer and Matt visited the IMC Chess Club in Skokie. Besides being welcomed by Bob Brauneker, I.M.C.'s chess leader, we met Frank Tegel who came up for the meeting. As we compared notes on the two League's systems, Matt demonstrated that years ago the tail-end teams were always the ones to fold up. However, since the teams were split into groups by relative strength the League has flourished. They are now up to 5 classes with about 8 teams in each class. The teams play a double round robin schedule - two matches a month. At season's end the President re-aligns teams to reflect their current known strength. Usually the last two teams of A section trade places with the top two teams of B section, etc. Thus, the teams are closely matched and an interesting struggle (usually resolved in the last match) occurs in every section.

Of course, there is much more flexibility in that League because all the teams are 4-man teams. Some clubs have 4 teams in 4 different sections. The practice is to name a 4 man roster for the A, B, & C teams and the rest of the club is eligible for the D team. If substitutions are needed as the season progresses, players can move up from the D section to C, and C to B, but these players cannot then play for the lower ranked team for the balance of the season. Thus, the weaker players are always pumped into team competition through the company's lowest ranked team.

Also, teams can request promotions or demotions within the class system, the decision being left up to those teams between the requestor's current slot and his requested slot. Incidentally, the C.C.L. of N.Y.'s A teams generally have one to three Masters and an Expert or two in the line-up. The United Nations' team has 28 Masters, including International Masters and national champions, to draw from. Some of the current and past stars of their League are IGM Sam Reshevsky, IGM Arthur Bisguier, Walter Shipman, Dr. Ariel Mengarini, and Paul Brandts.

Another topic covered was the possibility of staging a telephone match between composite teams from each League. Matt feels confident he can arrange for a place and a 20-man team from any of his 5 sections. The idea of the match would be to hold the event on a Saturday in an office which has telephone tie-lines to New York City. The first step, then, is to find such an office that would permit visitors to spend 4 hours using desks or tables and a couple of phones on a Saturday morning or afternoon. If any of you can arrange for such space, contact your Chairman. Getting the players and the assistants is a secondary problem.

Other ideas were discussed such as special events and individual awards (the writer gave a pile of extra 100 Shortcuts to Chess Victory by Koltanowski to Matt to help his program) and, all in all, the meeting proved to be a pleasant social evening as well as a midget sized chess organization seminar.

The most significant point that came out of the discussion was the value of dividing a League into homogeneous groups. For some time the idea has lurked in the back of your President's mind that, as the League grows, it should be broken into geographic sections. After all, we would all like to reduce the amount of travel entailed in some "away" games. But, at the same time, our program has sometimes lacked real challenge to the majority of our teams and has probably hastened the demise of a few teams through the years. For a few clubs like Western Electric and Argonne National Laboratories (occasionally Motorola and 1st National Bank and now Bell Labs) the schedule has been interesting because there is a good chance of winning the championship or runner-up trophy. For those teams with nothing at stake except to stay out of the cellar, however, there does not appear to be sufficient incentive to come out match after match.

Your President and Senior Division Chairman both feel that the League should examine the possibilities of division by team strength at the next business meeting in May.

#### AWARDS BANQUET SET FOR JUNE 18TH

The banquet committee, headed by Elaine Long, has selected the penthouse dining room in the Leaning Tower YMCA in Niles as the site of the 1971 awards dinner. The date is June 18th and the cost will be about \$5 per person.

Our special guest speaker will be Frank Skoff, Vice President of the U.S. Chess Federation. Also invited as a guest of the League is Mrs. Toni Walker who has done such a magnificent job of typing our bulletin this year.

The evening will be highlighted by trophy presentations and 7-minute chess. The committee is asking Team Captains to collect dinner fees from those members wishing to attend in advance to avoid time-wasting cash collection on banquet night.

A little assistance is still needed in arranging for appropriate decorations and for photography of trophy winners, etc. Anyone with an artistic flair is invited to contact Elaine (431-8202) or your President to help with room or table decor. Anyone with photographic skill is requested to volunteer to take pictures of the affair.

One point that needs clarification is whether there is enough interest in drinking after dinner to have the bar kept open during the speed chess tournament. Please poll your membership to get some kind of reaction as to how much demand for drinking we have. If there is relatively little interest in liquor purchases after dinner, we may reduce our commitment to the "Y" by closing the bar. Direct your replies to Elaine Long.

Queen's Gambit Declined

AN OLD FAMILIAR (?) TRAP - FROM TEAM COMPETITION

Notes by - J. Brotsos

This game is submitted to illustrate a trap that all QGD players should know. I learned it about ten years ago and waited patiently for someone to bite. Until this game, no one ever grabbed the tainted pawn because they knew better or, in a few cases, didn't know enough.

The same opening was played a year earlier when I played Jim Zahora in our first match. In that game, he played 5. P-K3 - just like a Grandmaster, and eventually I lost. In this game he falls for the illusion of a free pawn on his 6th move and loses a knight for the pawn. Since that game, I have shown the trap to several players in the League and found that most of them never came across this little gem.

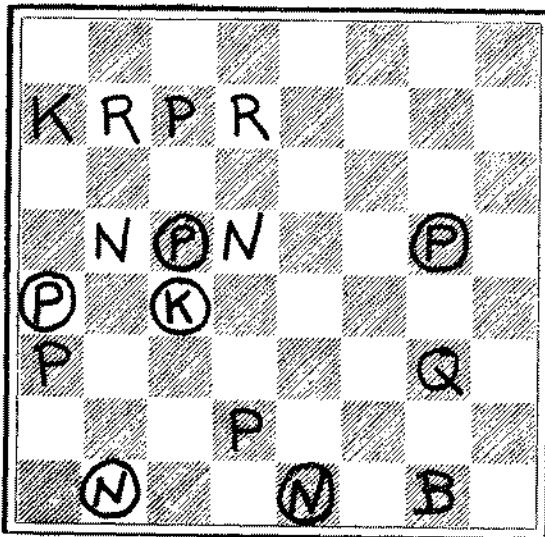

BLACK 6



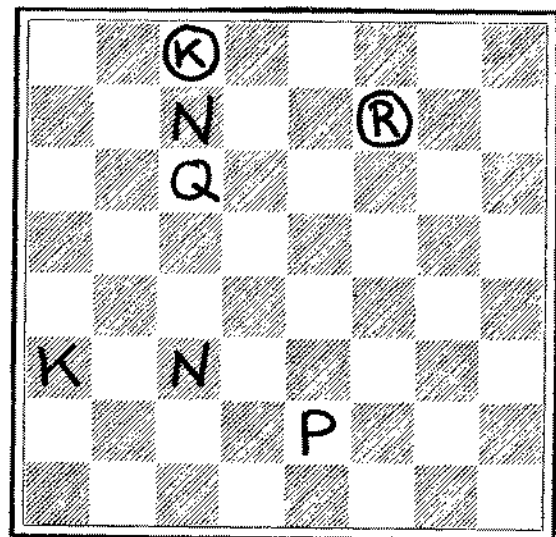
