CORRECTION

As noted by the President at the business meeting, there were two errors in the last Bulletin: neither Walter Goncharoff nor Bob Gleason, Jr. received cash prizes as reported in the Speed Chess Results article.

CHESS PROBLEMS

With this issue we launch the Problem Solving Contest for 1970-71. Please send your correct solutions to Newman Guttman at Bell Telephone Labs, Naperville, Ill. 60540. Solutions should be postmarked no later than September 25th.

For those of you who tackled Newman's sample problem the correction solution is as follows:

"Since both the WR on KN4 and the WB on KN6 appear to be somewhat out of play, it is natural to try 1. B-R5 as the key move. Does white then threaten mate? Yes, by 2. R-B4. But this trial key does pin white's own powerful queen. Is this serious? No. When the BK takes his two flight squares, Q3 and B3, he pins his own B on QN8. Then the WQ can mate on B2 and Q3 while pinned. (The self-pinning and subsequent line-pin mates of and by the WQ, together with the self-pinning of a black piece, constitute the 'theme' of the problem.)"

"The white bishop-rocket 'battery' also operates after the remaining black defenses 1.... BXQ, 1....R-B8, 1....P-N8 (Q) by 2. RXB, 2. RXP, 2. RXQ, respectively. A complete solution of this six-variation problem is:

- 1. B-R5, ---- 2. R-B4
- K-Q8 2. Q-B2
- K-B8 2. Q-Q3
- P-N8 (Q) 2. RXQ
- R-KB8 2. RXP
- BXQ 2. RXB"

It should be noted that former-Chairman Nick Goncharoff came in with a "cook" to this problem on August 6th. His more direct solution is:

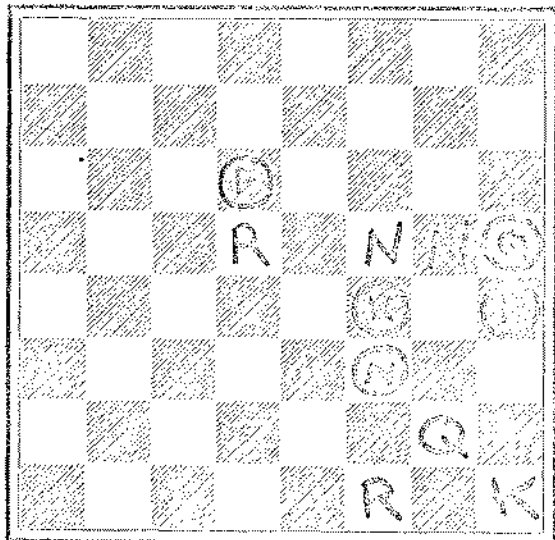
- 1. N-B4 +, K-B7 2. QXP
- K-B8 2. QXP
- K-Q8 2. Q-B2

It is surprising that in 22 years since the publication of this problem no one has brought this cook to Mr. Guttman's attention.

BLACK 5

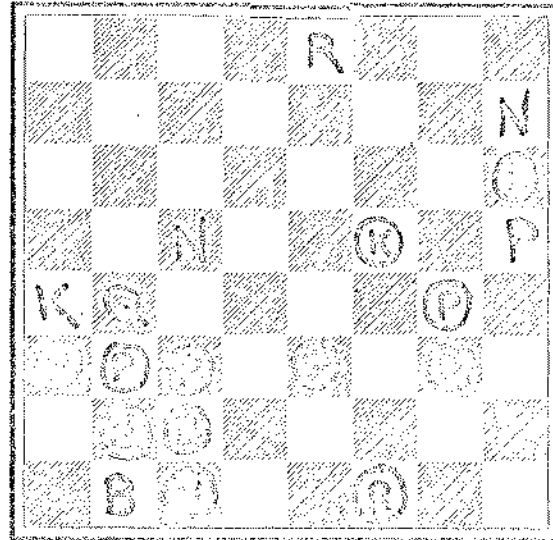


WHITE 6

The U.S. student chess team won the World's Championship in Isreal. Frank Skoff of Chicago was the Team Captain and Dick Veber also of Chicago played on the team. This is the first international chess competition won by America in ten years.

The U.S. Open was won by Bent Larsen, in clear second and third, respectively, were Pal Benko and Robert Byrne.

The first all Computer Chess Tournament has just gotten underway. One of the computer entrants is from Northwestern University another represents Bell Telephone Laboratories.

The solutions are:

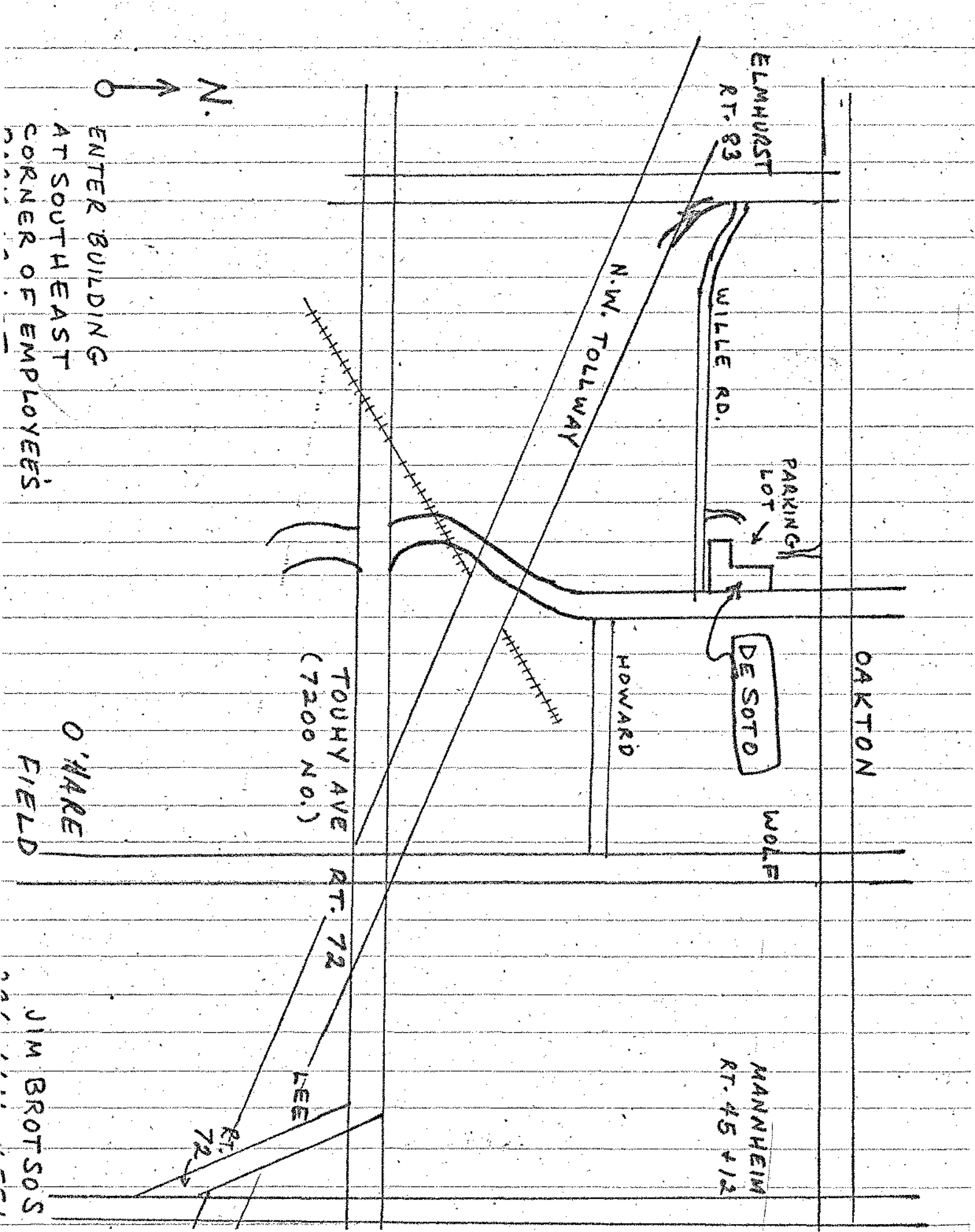
#1. Q-N1 (problem by A.M. Sparke, c. 1918) ✓
