3. Proposal to change rule 11D-1 in league constitution. This rule is to provide team captains a guideline for properly selecting a line-up for league matches.

President's Report

As the regular season of play nears a conclusion and the 8 victorious teams prepare for the playoffs, there does not seem to be any superpower destined to sweep the championship crown. Every team qualifying for the playoffs will have lost at least one match during the season. In fact, while in the process of preparing this report, I believe about 16 teams are still contending for playoff berths.

During the playoffs I would like to encourage team captains from non-qualifying teams to arrange exhibition matches with other teams, especially interdivisional matches. I would also like to draw to your attention your responsibility of submitting your MVP candidate (from your team) to your divisional chairman. The division chairmen will determine the winner for each division and I'll determine winner for the league. The formula to be used is as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of points scored (including forfeits)}}{\text{Average board position}}$$

The results will be normalized (to determine an overall league MVP) to account for the varying playing schedules during the regular season.

Mirsolav Mejzr 5th Industrial Tornado

This year's Tornado was attended by 48 players. Highlighting the event was the attendance of Mirsolav Mejzr who was introduced as the league's founder. Mirko brought a beautiful hand made chess board. This board and a set of pieces was offered as a brilliancy prize. Mirko is in the process of judging the 17 games that were submitted.

Finishing in first place with 4 points were 3 CIGL players (Ed Buerger, Greg Berry and Joe Owen). Tying for the B prize with 3 points were 7 players, 3 of whom were CIGL players (Irv Rosenfeld, Dan Kumro and George Dobbins).

AMERICANS MAKE THREE TITLE NORMS AT MARSHALL CHESS CLUB INTERNATIONAL By Bill Goichberg, Tournament Director

Never before has the USCF gained so many title norms for so little money (about \$3400) than at the 7th USCF International (Marshall International), played at the New York Club January 11-27 and sponsored by the American Chess Foundation and the club, as well as USCF.

Our young players continue to exceed all expectations; for the first time in over 30 years it seems possible we may actually have better young talent than the Soviets. Especially noteworthy at the Marshall tournament were the performances of the following

ANDY SOLTIS: Tying for first with Grandmaster Shamkovich, Soltis made his first GM norm. One of our few International Masters who is not a professional chess player, Soltis may never be able to put in the time needed to realize his full potential, but at age 29, his chances for the required second norm and the GM title look bright.

MICHAEL ROHDE: His second international tournament, his second IM norm. He has now qualified for the IM title at age 17, probably the youngest IM in the world (a Lebanese player who made IM in a Zonal may be younger, but he achieved no norms). Mark Diesen's record as the youngest American IM since Fischer lasted less than a month. Rohde made the norm easily with two rounds remaining and then, perhaps dizzy with success, lost his last two games. His score against GM's in the tournament: 2½-½!

MARK DIESEN: At 19 an IM by virtue of his being World Junior Champion, but he had never made the IM norm. He made it convincingly here, with a point extra--only a point short of the GM norm. His USCF rating should be almost 2440, which may be just a little short of 1977 US Championship qualification.

KENNETH REGAN: The most original, reckless, aggressive, and unpredictable of our juniors; he never plays a dull game. His results are also wildly volatile, and his Marshall performance reads like a fairy tale. Playing in his first International at 17, he took the lead with a 4-1 score, handing Soltis his only loss. Then, suddenly, everything changed, and he scored a total of ½ point in his next five games to fall to 4½-5½. A once certain-looking IM norm now seemed hopeless--to make the norm, he needed to score 3-1 against 3 GM's and an IM. Then came a draw with Lein and another with Matera--good results, but bad for IM chances; now he needed a perfect 2-0 against two GM's.

His next opponent, Shamkovich, was a point ahead of the field with 9-3 and red hot, having scored 5½ points in his last 6 games. Regan had not won a game in seven rounds, and in his typical style, opened 1 e4 c6 2 Nc3 d5 3 Qf3!? The Grandmaster soon went astray, allowing a series of combinative shots, and Regan scored a magnificent victory to keep his norm chances alive and pull Shamkovich back to a first-place tie with Soltis.

Then came the last round and the greatest hurdle of all--Black vs. Bisquier. Regan's problems with Black are notorious. In the 6th USCF Futurity (New York, September 1976), he scored 4½-½ with White and ½-3½ with Black. He won the National Congress Master Section in November, scoring 4-0 with White and two draws with Black. In this tournament he had also failed to win any games with Black, losing three. But here a win was a must, and he held on to survive his usual shaky defense and gain the upper hand. A little combination on move 36 forced the GM's resignation after the time con-

SEVEN YEARS OF LONE PINE
by Bill Goichberg

Probably the most generous individual sponsor in American chess history is Louis D. Statham, a retired inventor living in Lone Pine, California. Since 1971, his annual Masters tournament, popularly known as "Lone Pine," has provided huge prizes, fine playing conditions, and rare opportunities for American Masters to face strong opposition, all in a setting of remote and breathtaking beauty in the high Sierras.

Throughout the history of the tournament, the prizes have been steadily raised, as have the entry requirements. The initial event in 1971, actually a Master-Expert tournament open to all over 1999, had a \$2,500 prize fund. In 1972, prizes went up to \$5,500 and entry was limited to Masters and junior Experts. The 1977 event had a fantastic \$30,000 prize fund and was open to players rated 2350 and over and juniors 2250 and over.

The lower rating requirement for juniors has created a unique opportunity for rising young stars to speed their development. At Lone Pine, they are consistently "paired up" against stronger players, gaining experience essential to develop their potential.

Lone Pine has an illustrious list of past winners, as one might expect for a tournament in which Grandmasters sometimes make minus scores. In 1972 two favorites, GMs Browne and Bisguier, made a \$50 bet before the tournament on which one would score more points. No one won the bet- they both made even scores! Clearly, this is not the ordinary type of Swiss tournament.

Until 1977, the roster of Lone Pine champions included clear winners only (no ties for first), Grandmasters only, and men only. All of these traditions were broken this year when four players tied for first place, including Nona Caprindashvili, the Women's World Champion. Both Nona and IM Sahovic (Yugoslavia) made GM norms while sharing the top spot; the other two to reach the peak were Nona's countryman, GM Balashov (USSR), and GM Panno (Argentina). Following were Bill Lombardy and Larry Christiansen (6) and Walter Browne, Anatol Lein, Pal Benko, Leonid Shamkovich, Samuel Reshevsky, John Peters, Ken Regan, and Roy Ervin (5½).

Peters, who led for much of the tournament, made his first IM norm, as did Ervin. Regan, age 17, made his second IM norm in two tries, but still needs one more to gain the title.

Even the lower rated players are tough at Lone Pine, as GMs Szabo and Evans, among others, found out. The Hungarian GM, rated 2530, faced four American juniors (Regan, Rohde, Seirawan, Whitehead- average age 16) and scored a total of one point in these games! Even more unusual was the 3½-5½ score of Evans, the second rated player in the U.S., who played entirely opponents rated under 2400. Highlights of the "kids score vs. GMs" department: Regan beat Lein and Szabo and drew Shamkovich, 17-year old Michael Rohde beat Szabo and Evans and drew Panno and Quinteros, 16-year old Yasser Seirawan drew with Benko, Reshevsky, Shamkovich, Szabo, and Tarjan.

Previous Lone Pine winners: 1971 Evans, 1972 Gligorich, 1973 Bisguier, 1974 Browne, 1975 Liberzon, 1976 Petrosian.

I have fond memories of Lone Pine 1974, in which I scored 4-3 and made a 2400 performance rating. Following is an exciting game from that event.

White: Bill Goichberg Black: David Strauss French Defense

1 e4 e6
2 d4 d5
3 Nc3 Nf6
4 e5 ...

Down a pawn, White must go all out for attack- retreating the Knight from d4 is too passive. The exchange sacrifice removes Black's valuable "good Bishop" which controls black squares his white-based pawns cannot.

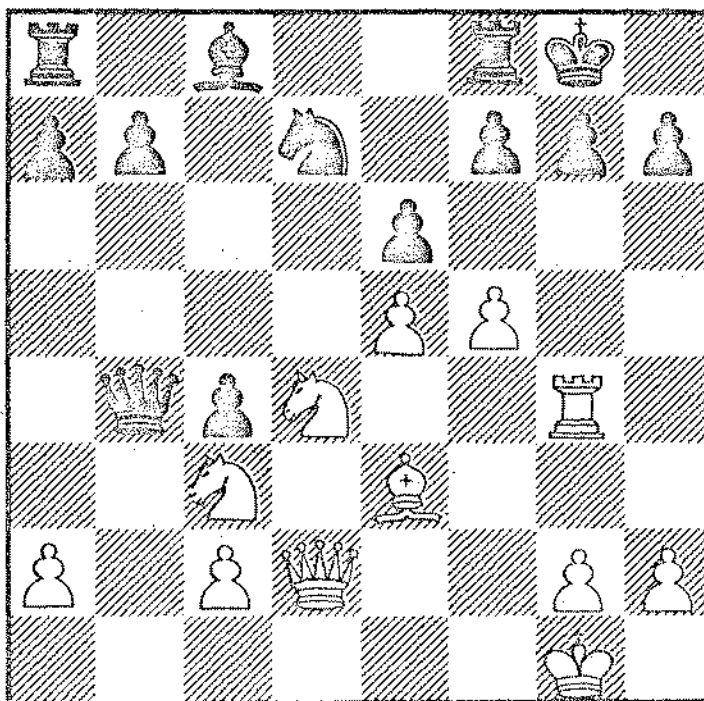
13 ... Qb4
14 f5 O-O

If ...a6 15 fe ab 16 ef or 15...fe 16 Ne6, Black is crushed.

15 Rf4?! ...

I wanted to attack with Bh6 and Qg5 without leaving the Knight on d4 en prise with check. Also, this move allows the Rook to shift to the g or h file. But time is lost, and the Rook already stood well on f1, supporting White's push to f6. Better seems 15 f6, or the deflecting sacrifice 15 a3 Qa3 16 f6, with a strong attack in either case.

15 ... Nc4
16 Bc4 dc
17 Rg4? ...



Trying to provoke the weakening ...g6. If ...Ne5, 18 Rg7! wins. However 17 f6 was better.

After the game, Strauss suggested 17...ef. During play, I gave this defense little thought, assuming 18 Nf5 would produce a winning attack. But it's not so simple- consider these fascinating possibilities:

A) 18 Nf5 Ne5 19 Rg7 Kh8 20 Bd4 Bf5 21 Be5 f6 and Black wins.

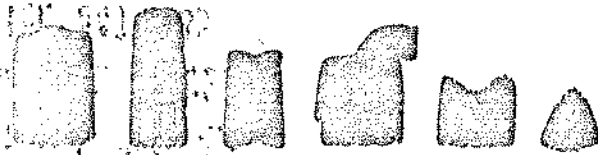
B) 18 Nf5 Ne5 19 Rg7 Kh8 20 Nd6. At Lone Pine, I suggested this to Strauss as winning. We assumed 20...Kg7 would allow mate and examined other lines, in which White fared well. But later, I noticed 20...Kg7 21 Bh6 Kg8 22 Qg5 Ng6 23 Qf6 Qc5 24 Kh1 Qe5! winning for Black.

C) Let's try a rook sac. 18 Rg7 Kg7 19 Nf5 Kg8 20 Bd4 f6 21 Qh6 Rf7 22 Re7 23 a3! Qa3 24 Nd5 and wins, or 22...Qf8 23 ef Qf7 24 Nd5! with a winning attack.

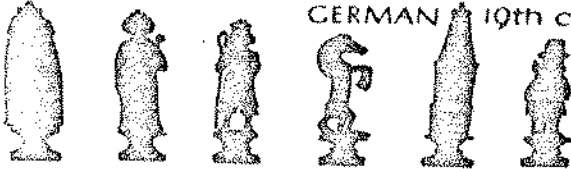
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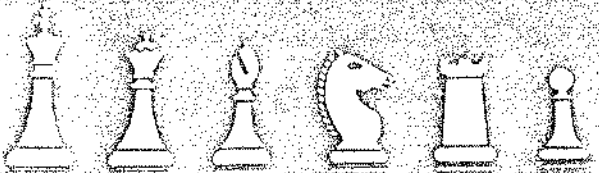

About forty teams from 27 different industries and educational institutions comprise the C.I.C.L. There is room for expansion and new teams will find friendly competitors and evenings of enjoyment.

The league schedules about 11 matches per team at intervals about 3 weeks apart starting after Labor Day.
