We wish you all a Merry Christmas and higher ratings for the New Year!

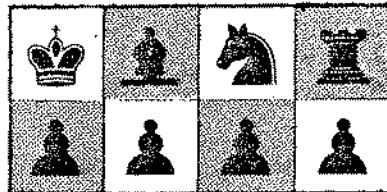
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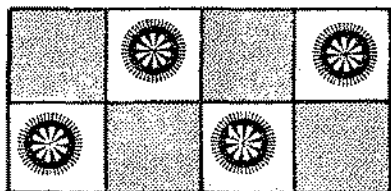
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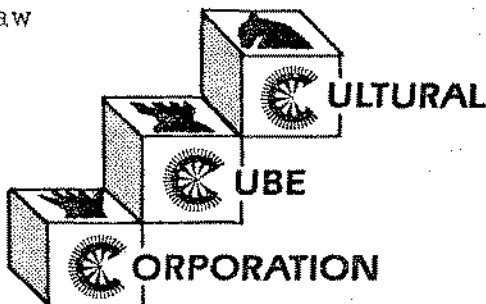

Far West Division Report by J. M. Brozovich

At this writing, we have completed our first three rounds of play. The official match results of the second round should appear elsewhere in this bulletin. In round three, the Wheaton Crusaders won the battle of the unbeaten teams by knocking off AMOCO 4½ to 1½. In the Argonne playoff, the Pawns beat the Rooks 4½ to 1½. The Western Electric Montgomery team drew with the Kingsmen and the BTL Royals beat Fermilabs by a score of 5 to 1.

So we have the Wheaton Crusaders in first place with a record of 3 and 0 and a three way tie for second place between the Argonne Pawns (last year's champions), the BTL Royals and AMOCO with records of 2 and 1. It looks like it's going to be another close race in the Far West this year.

In this particular test, the pieces were placed in a position that corresponded to the middle of an actual chess game. When they were removed, after five seconds, each subject was asked to recall the position from memory. As expected, the novice recalled only 4 positions, the intermediate 8 and the master got 16 correctly.

Next, the experimenters made a small but significant change: The same subjects, the same boards, the same five seconds' viewing—but this time the chess pieces were positioned randomly, in a way that could not have occurred in a real chess game.

**Chess master with no finesse:
a lesson on memory 'codes'**

PEOPLE ARE FOND of telling themselves that they have a "bad memory" and therefore it is hard for them to study and retain what they have learned. But memory is as much a matter of training as it is of inheritance; only a few freaks are born with what is called a "photographic mind."

You might think that these include the great chess players of the world, but you would be wrong. Perhaps one out of a hundred has an exceptional memory; the rest have simply trained themselves to recognize familiar patterns and combinations on the chessboard.

A FEW YEARS AGO, two researchers, Simon and Chase, wondered if chess masters really did possess a higher level of visual memory than other people. They put out a

most essential aspect of memory was demonstrated—the master recalled no more than the weakest player. Indeed, all three players averaged fewer than four positions correct.

THE RESEARCHERS CONCLUDED that chess masters are able to "code" actual game information into familiar chess patterns. After studying chess several hours a day for many years, a master can recognize between 10,000 and 100,000 patterns that keep repeating themselves. And, lacking such a coding pattern, the memory of a chess master is as limited as anyone else's.

One of the greatest players of all time was Alekhine, with a phenomenal memory for virtually every game he had ever played. Yet Alekhine consistently lost at bridge all the money he made playing chess—even though bridge is said to require an exceptional memory of its own. Alekhine's training did not

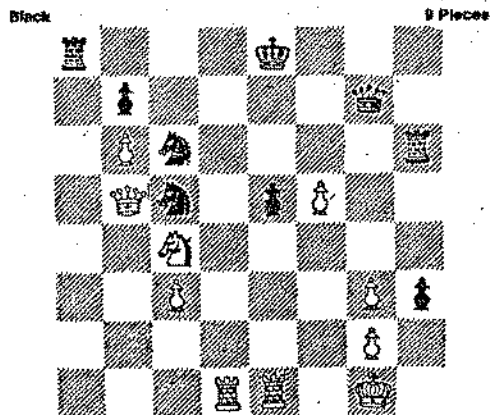

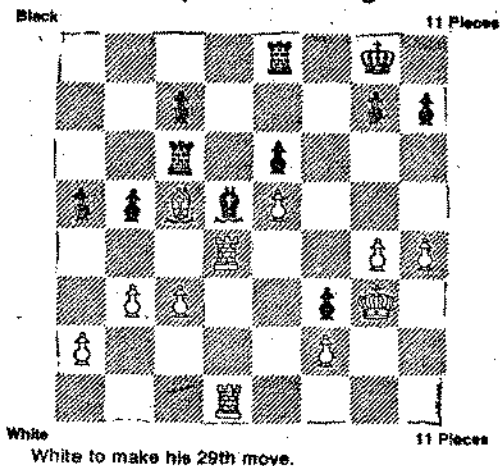
