League Meeting. On May 29th the new industrial league held its first meeting at the 1st Nat'l Bank of Chic. The results of the recent club poll on the subject indicated that our members are very interested in entering this league. On the strength of 10 replies in favor of the league and no dissentions, we accepted the invitation to join the league and sent Bradley, Stevenson, and Brotsos to attend the first meeting.

The general nature of competition was discussed and it was decided that the fixed team size would be 8 men. In order to prevent the possibility of "elite" teams within clubs it was decided that other members of the clubs could also play in these matches according to pre-arranged matching by the officials of the teams meeting in the particular match. The scoring will be on the basis of team (the top 8 men) and club (the team plus the other members who participate). Each club will play every other member company twice — once at home and once away. At the end of the 10 month season, team and club scores will be compared and a first and second prize will be presented to the top teams and top clubs. Small individual trophies will also be presented to the winning team members. Mr. Mejhr, pres. of the 1st Nat'l Bank club, has been chosen league sec'y; Stewart Warner has undertaken to draw up a league constitution. Chuck Bradley is in charge of establishing a general tournament schedule. Mention was also made of a season's end banquet sconsored by the 1st Nat'l Bank.
