On that evening ten members of the club met a group of chess players from Stewart Warner at the Palmer House and walked away with the contest, 8 to 2. The shortest games of the mest were Mary Smith's 15 minute massacre and Loren Carter's 20 minute chess lesson to a substitute playing at the 4th board. Bill Stevenson completely baffled his opponent with a King's Indian Reversed opening and Brotsos had an easy time on the black side of the Dragon Variation of the Sicilian Defense. Bob Tracheler's relentless king side attack ground his adversary into submission without much trouble. Tom Holder played black against a Giucco Piano and was busy bringing a mating attack to its climax when he had a moment of chess blindness and lost his queen and (about 30 moves later) the game. Del Ziegler and Charlie Kells deserve a pat on the back for turning lost games into victories. Bill Herschberger worked hardest for his win against the visitor's veteran. He finally picked up a bishop and had a rook in the bag when his opponent resigned. Ernie Amodei, one of our most improved players, suffered from stage fright and lost his match game. Our next match will be at the Chicago Title & Trust Co. downtown. This promises to be a much stronger club; it is older and more established than S. W. and boasts at least one expert, John Dunworth who drew with Reshevsky in last spring's simultaneous exhibition.

Members who indicate they will play in this match are asked to notify Stevenson, Brotsos, or Bradley if circumstances prevent them from attending. A phone call as late as the day of the match can prevent the opponent's furnishing a chess player who will have no one to play.

It is also suggested that members, at least in the top 6 positions, keep records of their match games so that the club officers can check them over for flaws in our play or peculiarities in our opponents openings. Information of this type can amount to a scouting file and will be useful as competition becomes tougher.

Other League Scores. Last week the other league teams played their opening matches with the following results: The 1st Nat'l Bank team won, 6-2 and their club won, 6-3 against Ill. Bell. Chic. T. & T. won the team match from Western Elec.,  $4 \frac{1}{2} - \frac{3}{2} \frac{1}{2}$  but lost the club competition,  $7 \frac{1}{2} - \frac{5}{2} \frac{1}{2}$ .

Board of Directors Meeting. On Sept. 23 the club Board of Directors held its first formal meeting. The treasurer's petty cash fund (\$13.69) was counted and found to be in good order.

The simultaneous chess exhibition was discussed and it was decided to cancel this event this fall. Despite repeated attempts to contact Sol Friedman, he still has not agreed to a specific date for the match. As an alternate activity, however, Bradley, Stevenson, Herschberger, and Holder have indicated that they are willing to play several boards at once. Therefore we will plan to have simultaneous chess featuring some or all of these aces at the next meeting, Oct. 140

It was decided to place an order for another year's subscription to the Chess Review . Also, the book, The World's Great Chess Games, and a set of wooden, felted, weighted chessmen (with a 3 1/4 in. King) are being ordered as prizes for next year.

Since elections are right around the corner, nominations were discussed. It was decided to allow members to nominate themselves, as well as others, for office; the attached blank is provided for this purpose. Remember, according to the constitution, Brotses and Bradley cannot continue serving in their present positions in 1958.

Contest Scoring. The judge of the problem solving contest has assigned numerical values to each of the contest problems for purposes of evaluating answer sheets. The problems were judged on such factors as number of initial moves open to white, number of moves or variations required in the solution, the relative subtlety of the winning motif, and the extent to which the moves are forced.
