For their individual part in their teams' performance these players deserve a special pat on the back. Especially remarkable are the records of Erwin Puto and Walter Elliott who have played for Western Electric since the first year of League activity. Their attendance records speak for themselves. Their total scoring has been sensational. Erwin has won 28, drawn 5, and lost 5 (4 of these in the first season) for a total of 30-1/2 points. Walter has won 26, drawn 8, and lost only 4 for a total of 30 points; Walt has also served his team as captain. Both played in last year's all-star match against Austin with Erwin winning his game in about 20 minutes and Walt drawing with expert Martin Klein.





RESHEVSKY EXHIBITION

Many chess players and chess friends will remember the evening of February 14, 1961 as an unforgettable event. Thirty-five chess players from Hawthorne, the Chicago Industrial Chess League, and various Chicago chess clubs competed against the grandmaster Samuel Reshevsky. About thirty enthusiasts and kibitzers observed the great performance.

The exhibition was so full of tension that the rustle of a paper bag sounded like thunder through the large hall of the Albright Gymnasium.

Will Hammerschmidt was the only player who achieved a draw against the world champion of the West, while all other players lost. "Sammy" accepted the draw after an exchange maneuver by Will in which the grandmaster lost a pawn and somewhat the position.


