USCF Rating Calculations. From the Chess Correspondent which is the publication of the Correspondence Chess League of America we give the following excerpt from an article by Carl Diesen which concisely explains the USCF rating calculations for rated and unrated players.

"The USCF uses two calculation formulas. For new players in a tournament who do not already have ratings, the number of losses is subtracted from the number of wins. The difference is divided by the number of games played. That quotient is multiplied by 400 and added to the average of the ratings of his opponents.

"For players already having ratings, the USCF multiplies the difference, wins minus losses, by 16 and adds this to the previous rating but they also add four per cent of the algebraic sum of the differences in rating between the player and each of his opponents to get the final new rating. If the difference in rating is more than 350 points, they use 350 for the calculation."




