Rules for Seven-Minute Speed Tournament. The following rules will govern the speed event to be held at our annual banquet. Clocks will be set at seven minutes before the hour. A player must make a move and punch the clock with the same hand. A player wins on time if his opponent's flag drops before his own time limit expires and the player notices it. If both flags are down before either player notices it the game is a draw. However, a game cannot be won on a time forfeit if it would be impossible (not just improbable) for the game to be won otherwise. The game is a draw if there is not enough material left on the board for either player to checkmate the other. An illegal move loses the game automatically.

Gompers All-Empert Team Wins Chicagoland Championship. Gompers Park (Team Number I) beat out eight other teams April 25 to capture the Chicagoland Team Championship. This was a five-round 30-minute game Swiss event sponsored by the Chicago Chess Foundation. 


