Sandrin Wins 30/30 Tournament. The league began its season with a most successful opening event. Thirty-two players competed in a 30/30 chess tournament held at Western Electric's Albright Gym on Saturday, September 12. Play began at 9:30 A.M. and was concluded at 7:30 P.M. for a full and exciting day for the chess fans.

Trailing by one-half point going into the last round, Angelo Sandrin of Argonne defeated Slavko Mihailovich to win the event with a score of $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$. Second place honors were shared by Nick Goncharoff of Motorola, Victor Narkevicius a guest of Stewart-Warner, Morton Hamermesh and Slavko Mihailovich, both of Argonne. A complete cross-table appears on page 2.

Representatives from and guests of Western Electric, Argonne National Labs, Stewart-Warner, Sunbeam, Illinois Bell, Motorola and First National Bank participated. Although this was the first time the League has sponsored such an event, the interest and enthusiasm shown by the participants promise to make it at least an annual affair.

Argonne and Western Electric Teams, First National Bank Triumph in Opening Matches. When it appeared as though the match might end in a draw, Ken Dopheide came from behind to win and give the WE Chargers a victory over Motorola, $5\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$. The Argonne Bishops initiated Goss Printers into the League by defeating them $6\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$. Jim Jackson was held to a draw on first board by Valdis Tums while George Kral scored for Goss in the win column. Valdis Tums has a USCF Expert rating of 2058. The Argonne Knights beat Stewart-Warner/Sunbeam $5\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ and the WE Gambiteers downed Illinois Bell 6-2. First National Bank defeated Johnson & Johnson 6-2. In this match Barendsen won in six moves, Tiranti lost a Rook in a won position (a draw resulting) and Bukowski lost his Queen outright (not a sacrifice) and mated his opponent three moves later!

The distinctive move constituting the Steinitz Gambit is 5. K-K2! In the words of Loyd: "The originality of the problem is due to the white King being placed in absolute safety, and yet coming out on a reckless career, with no immediate threat and in the face of innumerable checks."

Solution: 1. K-K2 P-B8(Q)ch 2. K-K3 P-B8(N)ch 2. R-B2ch K-Q5 2. R-B4ch

This was a tough one. Several incorrect solutions were received, all of which, strangely enough, began with 1. B-Q3ch. They overlooked Black's best reply on move 2 or 3.




