Tarrasch, after losing two world championship matches to Lasker, filled books with proofs that he should have won. Bogolyubov against Alekhine was so nonplused at some of his own lapses that he could only hazard the theory that his great adversary must have been hypnotizing him. How often has a tournament winner been called lucky, because of his opponents' demonstrable oversights? You read of games which were "unworthy of the tournament in which they were played, both sides committing gross blunders:" More discriminating investigation might reveal that the ultimate winner had managed at all costs and even some risks to force the game, into just the sort of position his opponent hated. To make him paint railway engines when he wanted to paint horses! Which is enough to spoil the most academical style."

Chargers Win Championship. The Western Electric Chargers clinched the League Championship by downing the Argonne Bishops $5\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ on May 3. After beating Goss Printers in April, $7\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, the Chargers needed one match point in their last two matches. The final match against the Argonne Knights will be played June 1.

The Argonne Pawns remained in second place by winning a forfeit match against Stewart-Warner/Sunbeam and losing to Hall-Roto, $4\frac{1}{2}-3\frac{1}{2}$. Motorola moved into a tie for 4th by beating Goss Printers, 5-3. The Western Electric Gambiteers also moved into a tie for 4th by beating Stewart-Warner/Sunbeam, 5-3, and losing to Goss Printers. 6-2.

Illinois Bell remained in 7th place by winning a forfeit match from the Argonne Knights and losing to Goss Printers, 5-3. Hall-Roto upset the Argonne Pawns to hold their 8th place position. Goss Printers made up their matches at a heatic pace, winning from the Western Electric Gambiteers, 6-2, and Illinois Bell, 5-3, and losing to the Western Electric Chargers, $7\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, and Motorola, 5-3.
