Second place hours were shared by Walter Grombacher, a guest of Western Blectric, Ted DeParry of the Argonne Bishops, and Victor Narkevicius, a guest of Stewart-Warner.

Tied for fifth through ninth were Slavko Mihailovich of the Argonne Knights, Chester Lee of First National Bank, Robert Bloom, a guest of Western Electric, Nik Goncharoff of Motorola, and Bill Perez of Illinois Bell. A complete crosstable appears on page 2.

This victory may have put Ed over the 2400 mark, and if so, he will be Illinois' first Senior Master. Bringing the Black king to the center is the best winning try. After 37 B-Q8ch K-B2 (any other 37th move by White is only a transposition, since after 37...K-B2 the only answer to the threatened 38...K-N3! is 38 B-Q8), any piece move by White loses immediately, and every pawn move leads to eventual zugzwang except 38 P-QN4! After 38 P-QN4! there are two winning tries for Black:




