### BY-LAWS RE-VAMPED

At the business meeting of September 21st, (see enclosed minutes) the revision of the League's Policies and Rules was completed. The most significant changes in this session were the formation of an alumni team program and the definition of the team captains' responsibilities. Copies of the revised Policies & Rules are being mailed directly from the editor's office to all officers and team captains.

#### 30-30 SWISS PLANNED

The League membership has shown interest in supporting another Swiss Tournament at 30 moves in 30 minutes. Frank Tegel and Stan Ockers were asked to serve as Co-chairmen in organizing and running the event.   Other? (specify)

Please send your answers and suggestions to Stan Ockers. As time-place details and playing rules are developed, we will publish more information. Let's have a showing from the Junior Division this year! Team Captains: talk it up!

### OTHER SPECIAL EVENTS

Other programs or events discussed as possibilities for this year were as follows:

#### A. Simultaneous Exhibition

A local master such as Greg DeFotis or Dick Verber could be invited to play a number of us at once. Such chess stars expect fees, so we would probably have to charge our players two or three dollars admission charge to cover expenses. Please poll your membership as to how many would want to play in such an exhibition (and pay the board fee) and what nights of the week would be preferable.

### B. Telephone Match

Matt Pavitt, the President of the Commercial Chess League of New York, has suggested a team match between his league and ours to be held on a Saturday between company locations having tie lines between Chicago and New York. Hopefully, about 20 boards would be played. Because of the complications in relaying moves from a few central phones to the chess players, such an event would probably require several non-playing workers to man telephones or transmit moves to and from our players. Please check to see how many of your members would be interested in devoting a Saturday afternoon to playing in this kind of a match and how many people (teenage chess-playing sons should be considered) could be expected to help run the affair.

#### C. Unscheduled Team Matches

Team captains are encouraged to use bye rounds or other lulls in their schedules to arrange informal matches with teams they normally do not play. Such matches could include rated games. If two players agree that the game they are to play will affect their ratings, the result could be sent to Jim Warren for adjustment in rating immediately after the match. Such reports should be si ped by both parties to show Jim that the rating aspect was agreed upon by both parties.

C. Unscheduled Team Matches - Cont'd.

On a more grandiose scale, an all star match could be held pitting the best of the two divisions against each other. If you are interested in this idea, tell your Division Chairman. This type of clash should be promoted and coordinated by Frank Tegel and Steve Schwartz.

Another variation would be an A.T. & T. vs the rest of the League match. An A.T. & T. team, with top players from Western Electric, Bell Labs, Ill. Bell, & Teletype, would present a worthy challenge to the rest of the League's stars.

### AWARDS BANQUET

A committee comprised of Elaine Long, Chairman, Phil Miller, and Lou Aldort was appointed to plan next June's awards dinner. The next program will not include any business meeting and will be placed in a larger, air conditioned room with the emphasis on awards, socializing, and speed chess. - 2. Two points will be awarded to correct solutions for two-movers, three points will be scored for correct solutions to three-movers, and four points for four-movers.



### FOUR TROPHIES FOR JUNIOR DIVISION

Steve Schwartz has suggested that the number of team trophies awarded for his division's competition be increased to four. His reason is that the current ratio of trophyeligible clubs to trophy is 8 to 3 or 2.7 to 1 for the Senior Division and 12 to 3 or 4 to 1 for the Junior counterpart. His proposal would decrease the ratio to 3 to 1. The other officers have been consulted on this and generally agree with Steve's proposal. Therefore, we will plan to award four suitable trophies to the top teams in the Junior Division.
