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A word from the President

Welcome to the 42nd season of the Chicago Industrial Chess League.

There are currently twenty-one teams scheduled to play this year. Our Division Chairmen have pulled together schedules and directories and these are all provided in this issue.

Each of the four CICL divisions has had a change in the number of teams.

Gone is the perfect balance and easy double-round robin scheduling of last year. We now have five teams in both the East and the Far West, and there only four in the Near West. Fortunately, we've seen the North grow by one team as the Exemplars split and the return of the Excalibers alumni team. An idea to increase play through interdivisional matches was raised at the Fall Business Meeting, but, this was not implemented because of odd numbers of teams in the divisions and travel concerns.

The change in the number of teams has also given me concern for the direction of the CICL. In looking back to our roots, Jim Brotsos recalled three points of our original charter: 1) Set aside some dues for trophies, 2) Make the best effort to order lineups correctly and 3) MAXIMIZE PARTICIPATION. This is a good time to remember that our objective is simply to provide quality chess to as many people as possible. There have been some late proposals also for dropping down into three divisions, and I do not know if this will serve our goal to provide more good games, but this should be discussed at the Spring meeting and voted in the Fall if necessary.

Special thanks go to Ruben for pulling together another great bulletin.

We lost a prospective Games Editor to relocation over the summer, but Tom Friske has stepped up to help continue the popular games featured in our bulletin.

We have already scheduled a match against the Elmhurst Chess Club. The date will be January 24, 1999. For those of you who follow football, this is the Sunday before the Super Bowl.

Please note that this bulletin has been mailed out to all new team captains, league officers and any extra subscribers from last year. I encourage everyone to get the dues in and register new subscriptions early. The form to do this is also included in this issue.

MINUTES

1. President Pat Sajbel called the meeting to order at 7:30 pm.

2. OFFICERS REPORTS:

President:

Pat noted that this is the second and final year of his term and asked people to start thinking about this position for the next term. Perhaps someone from the Far West Division since it has rotated with the other 3 divisions the last 3 times. Pat also reported there is some difficulties getting this year's schedule from some divisions.

Secretary:

The minutes of the spring meeting (April 7) were unanimously accepted as written by Tony.

Treasurer:

Lenny prepared a proposed budget for the 1998-99 season (see attached). We had a net loss of \$385 last year. This was partly due to being over budget on the refreshments at the playoffs and some special awards at the banquet. The league is, however, in good shape with over \$1,500 in savings and checking. Lenny

reported that 10 teams did not collect their \$17 deposit at the banquet. The budget was unanimously accepted.

Lenny prepared a dues schedule (see attached). There is a need to increase the price for the additional subscriptions. Last year it was \$7 and Lenny proposed \$8. Although the actual cost is closer to \$9, the proposed \$8 cost was unanimously accepted. Finally, the cost for our banquet will also increase. It was proposed to increase the banquet ticket 2 dollars to \$19. Considering the good location, the service and space etc. it was agreed that this is still a good value. The individual team dues and team bulletin subscription will remain at \$40 and \$13 respectively. Therefore the basic team charges for this year will be \$72, an increase of \$2. This fee structure was unanimously accepted.

Division Chairmen:

Far West-Irwin Gaines

Irwin reported that 4 teams will be returning for sure. Wheaton will not have a team this year. Argonne may only have 1 team and they are undecided in playing in the Far West (to make 5 teams) or the Near West Division. Amoco is a possible new team to the division. Near West-Howard Klinefelter, not present

Pat reported that 5 teams could return again with Argonne Knights being a possible 6th.

North-Robert Morris

Bob reported there will be 5 teams with Motorola having 1 team this year. There is a possibility of Sears being the 6th team.

East-Jim Duffy representing for Kelvin McAlister Jim reported there will be 5 teams.

There was a discussion around interdivision play, especially where some divisions will be short. Irwin mentioned that this has worked out well between FW and NW. He offered to talk to the East and NW division chairmen this year to try and work out a schedule. Pat reminded us that this needs to be firmed up soon and set September 15 as the completion date.

3. OTHER REPORTS:

Bulletin Editor:

The league is fortunate to have Ruben Reyes remain as bulletin editor, at least for the foreseeable future. We will continue to ask all teams to record and submit their games (score sheets were distributed). Marty and Wayne have already talked and there will be a smooth transition, Marty having been the chairman previously.

4. ELECTIONS/NEW APPOINTMENTS:

None are required at this time except for the attempt, as previously mentioned, to get a games editor.

5. NEW TEAMS:

Al Litvinas of Alumni Aces asked approval for Ruben Reyes, Leonid Sagalouski, and Kazys Jakstas to join his team. This was passed unanimously.

6. KEY DATES:

The playoffs will be May 15, 1999. (Kemper is a possible site again, but other offers will be considered).

The banquet will be June 4, 1999 at Harvey's Prime Rib.

7. OLD BUSINESS:

- a) A draft Player Conduct was presented at the Spring meeting. Marty and Wayne finalized it a couple of months ago and most people had seen it by email. Copies were distributed at this meeting (see attachment). For clarification, the Officers that will review disputes are the 7 as written in our current constitution. There was a suggestion to allow for skipping some of the steps to take for a very serious violation. Since the likelihood of needing to do this seemed quite low, it was decided not to change anything at this time. The proposal was unanimously accepted and is now in effect. Wayne will add this to the constitution.
- b) We discussed the regular season tie break system. Irwin proposed a more equitable system. His proposal was accepted and will be effective this season.(see attached).
- c) Pat reported on the drubbing the CICL took with our match with the OP-RF chess club on August 25 (14 1/2 to 5 1/2). There were some excuses but they don't change the score. On the positive side, 20 players participated.

Pat announced plans to try a match with the Elmhurst club some time in February. We will probably have another match with OP-RF. Check the bulletins for updates.

8. NEW BUSINESS:

a) As mentioned earlier, the mail lists need to be updated.

Ruben requested that both players submit their games to make it easier to review the game (errors, handwriting etc.). Also, please make some indication on your game if you think it is particularly interesting or noteworthy. This will be a flag for Ruben.

There was some discussion about the practice of not showing the losers name when a game is included in the bulletin. Most people thought it would be nice to see who the person was (in most cases one can find this out anyway). It was decided to leave it up to Ruben.

The CICL would like to find a games editor to assist the bulletin editor. Kevin Schmuggerow was identified for this position, but he has moved out of state. Other candidates were identified and will be contacted.

Ratings Chairman:

Art is asking division chairmen to submit a list of all team names with captain/cocaptain information (tel. #, email, fax etc.). He sometimes has to contact people to clarify information. Pat would also like it to include in the bulletin. The appropriate copy of the match result sheet needs to be submitted to Art either by FAX or mail as follows:

Pat reported that the banquet will be held at Harvey's Prime Rib again.

Publicity Chairman-David Sacks

Dave reported that the Illinois Chess Association will publish news about the CICL in their bimonthly magazine because we are affiliate members. This is a very good magazine for local personalities and games. Subscription is only \$14 per year. Tony will have an article included in the next issue. They will also give the results of our recent match with the OP-RF club. Dave is active in chess in schools and talked about some possible ways of interacting with them. He will get from Carl Reid the prepared one page description of the CICL and pass it around at tournaments to try and get some interest.

Trophy Chairman-Marty Franek, not present

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b) Wayne discussed the idea behind his recently emailed Handicap Proposal (see attached). Since there was no real interest in any kind of handicap system to help the lower rated players that "constantly" face much higher rated players, Wayne withdrew his proposal.

Dmitry reviewed his proposal of having weaker teams play each other, likewise with stronger teams. There is genuine interest in this idea and a discussion followed on how this could work, especially between divisions. Due to some obvious logistical problems, there was no clear solution. In order to pursue this idea, it was decided to poll all team captains to get some idea as to the willingness to travel on a limited basis to play other divisions. Pat will follow up.

- c) With the number of teams per division decreasing, Dave questioned if the second place award was meaningful. With awards being our biggest cost, and the league running at a defecit, Tony suggested we limit or eliminate the second place award for regular season play. A motion was made and passes (with1 no vote) that second place teams in regular season play will be offered either 1 team trophy, one equivalent value gift certificate, or the option to use the cost of 1 team trophy toward individual trophies (the team paying the balance). This is effective for this year.
- 9. The meeting was adjourned at 10:00pm.

I. CONSTITUTION

B. CONDUCT

1. Expected Conduct

The actions and behavior of CICL members at sponsored activities (business meetings, matches, tournaments, banquets etc.) shall be in accordance with the spirit of fair play and good sportsmanship. The following is a list of actions and behaviors that are considered inappropriate and not accepted by the CICL. The list serves as an example and is not intended to be exhaustive.

- ~Repeated or gross violation of the Constitution.
- ~Disruptive behavior.
- ~Cheating in a game of chess.
- ~Deliberate misrepresentation of a teams roster or individual ratings.
- ~Participating in a tournament under a false name or while under suspension.
- ~Offensive racial remarks, offensive profanity, or threats of physical harm directed at another CICL member.
- ~Intentional pushing, shoving, hitting, punching of another CICL member.

2. Procedures For Improper Conduct

At each sponsored CICL event, a member is in charge of the activity (e.g. the *President at business meetings, home team captains at matches, tournament directors, banquet chairman). With this responsibility comes the authority to take appropriate action whenever a member's actions or behavior is contrary to our rules of conduct, or whenever a complaint is brought to his attention concerning another member.

The person in charge will first try to resolve the matter amicably. If this is not possible, he will take the following steps, in this order:

- a. Officially warn the offender of his improper conduct, with an explanation as to what specific actions are not within the guidelines of the league's Constitution.
- b. Give a second warning to the offender and inform him of the consequence of a 3rd offence.
- c. Ask the offender to leave the meeting/activity.

Items b. or c. will require a written notification to the league President. This should include the specific improper conduct, the circumstances, the warnings that were given, and the names of any witnesses. The offender is encouraged to do the same.

The league Officers will meet (or conference call) as soon as practical to review the situation and determine what level of sanction, if any, to apply to the offender. The Officers will act objectively and fairly and gather as much information about the incident as reasonably practical, including discussions with the parties involved.

The league President will read or distribute copies of the complaints or notifications as well as any decisions made at the next scheduled business meeting.

The decision of the Officers will printed in the Bulletin. The President will inform the parties involved of the decision in writing (email acceptable). The offender's team captain will be asked to help enforce any sanctions as appropriate.

3. Sanctions

The following sanctions may be imposed by the Officers:

- a. A written reprimand and warning.
- b. Suspensions from the next scheduled match, meeting, tournament, banquet or other event.
- c. A one years suspension from all league activity.
- d. Expulsion from the league.
- 4. The decision of the league officers is final and there are no provisions for appeal.

^{*} Note: At business meetings the League President conducts these meetings according to Robert's Rules of Order (Article I.D.1.). In this capacity, he has authority to end or Table discussions as necessary.

DRAFT PROPOSAL FOR A HANDICAP SYSTEM

Before dismissing this idea completely, please read through the proposal.

BACKGROUND:

I have observed over the past few years that, at least in the Near West Division, a number of chess players "get stuck" playing someone rated much, much higher than themselves over and over again. 300 to 400 rating point difference is not unusual, and sometimes it is much more. If this is an occasional occurrence, than one can take it as a challenge and see how well one can do. Or, one can look at it as a free lesson (i.e. see how the expert did me in) and try and learn from the mistakes. However, if this occurs almost every match throughout the season, it must get quite discouraging for the underdog. I wonder if this contributes to some people dropping out. Who among us enjoy getting thrashed all the time.

On the other hand, the higher rated player most likely got that rating through much hard work and dedication. He is reaping the rewards for his efforts. And why not, it's the American way. Anyone else should be able to work just as hard and become a good player also (at least in theory).

It seems like both sides have valid arguments. And I'm not try to devise a handicapping system (like bowling or golf) that puts everyone on a level playing field. What I am proposing is a small concession to someone at least 300 rating points less than his opponent. This concession would be choice of colors and a time control adjustment.

When you consider it, even the USCF has some leveling effect in most of their tournaments. For a Class Tournament, this is obvious because you only play those in your class (within 200 rating points). In a Swiss System Tournament, you frequently end up playing someone in the later rounds with a rating similar to yours because you both have the same win/loss record in that particular tournament.

PROPOSAL:

Minimum Conditions:

The handicap system can be implemented prior to a game starting and only when:

- 1) there is more that a 300 rating point difference between opponents, and
- 2) the lower rated player has an established CICL rating less that 1400.

Implementation:

When the minimum conditions are met, the lower rated player has the option of implementing the Handicap System (HS) by:

- 1) Informing his opponent the he is using the HS. (Both players should inform their team captains, but this is not required).
- 2) Choosing the white or black pieces (irrespective of board number, visitor or home team).
- 3)Confirms time control with opponent (normal time control for lower rated player, game 75 for higher rated player).
- 4) Sets or verifies the correct starting times on the clocks.

Scoring Results:

- 1) The score sheets and match result sheet should indicate HS or Handicap System beside the name of the person implementing this option.
- 2) The games will be rated in the normal fashion.

Multi-team Tie Break Criteria

Here is a terse but hopefully logically complete explanation of the multi-team tie break criteria:

- 1) Tie breaking rules for 2-way ties (per CICL constitution)"Ties in the final standings for trophies (including 1st/2nd) and for league
 championship playoff eligibility will be settled by the following tie-break methods,
 applied in the order listed:
 - a) head-to-head match score between the two teams during the regular season;
 - b) head-to-head game score between the two teams during the regular season, including forfeits;
 - c) Game points, including forfeits [this is presumably total game points]
 - d) Sum of the match points of the opponents that the team beat, plus half of the match points of the opponents that the team tied.
 - e) Formula d, substituting game points for match points"
- 2) Multiple team ties will be resolved as follows: when there is a multiple team tie, the tie-breaking criteria are applied in order a-e but amongst all teams, NOT as individual tie-breakers between the individual teams (if you did that you could end up in the situation where team A beats team B, team B beats team C, but team C beats team A on the 2-way tiebreakers, a situation that is impossible to resolve!!). Any remaining ties proceed to the next tie breaking criteria, applied only among the teams that are still tied (so in particular if one of teams is ahead after the first tie break criteria and the other teams are still tied, the first team gets first place, and criteria b is applied to the remaining teams only)

Tactics

Desperado - The idea behind this tactic is to bring down as many pieces with a piece that's about to be captured. Here's a sample.

This is **Pablo Diaz** (1979) vs.
