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A word from the President

Welcome back to a new CICL season. As my first official act as your newPresident I presided over a lively fall business meeting, which will provide the material for several future columns. Please read the minutes (included elsewhere in this bulletin) +carefully. I will mention some of the highlights here, and i expect that several of these issues will be further discussed in the bulletin and in e-mail during the course of the season.

Old, new and combined teams:

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There will be several "new" teams this year as Motorola has split into two teams, the former CTA team has returned, and a Post Office team is getting organized as I write. On the other hand, three Lucent teams in the Far West have combined into two teams, and two Bank teams in the East have combined into one. I'm not sure if we are heading into an era of "super" teams, if interest in chess is down, or if company downsizing makes it harder to find players. I welcome your thoughts on increasing league membership!

Player pool:

A rarely exercised league rule was invoked this year to allow an individual player from the so-called "player pool" to join a team that had difficulty filling out its lineup. More discussion of this rule in later bulletins.

Dues, trophies, banquets and bulletins:

Several actions were taken to try to bring our_finances onto an even keel, after several years of running deficits. Dues were raised slightly. We decided to award only one set of trophies per team (ie, no separate trophies for division placing for teams placing in the top three overall in the playoffs; instead one trophy with two separate inscriptions), as well as other measures to hold down the cost of trophies. We discussed and rejected requiring each team to purchase two banquet tickets instead of one; nevertheless we need to discuss ways to increase banquet attendence; we will try to have a high quality speaker again at this year's banquet. Finally, we will explore electronic distribution of the bulletin to try to save postage and duplicating costs.

Knockout team competition:

It was suggested that we explore having a year long double elimination knockout team tournament to provide some additional competition against different teams and players. Interest centered around a format with 4-man teams and faster (eg game/60) time controls. A detailed proposal will be circulated shortly, again, feel free to offer any ideas and suggestions to me at gaines@fnal.gov or to the entire email list.

MINUTES

- 1. President Irwin Gaines called the meeting to order at 7:15pm.
- 2. OFFICERS REPORTS:

President:

Irwin welcomed all attendees and thanked Lucent for hosting the meeting. There is more to report under item 4 and 7 below.

Secretary:

The minutes of the spring business meeting as reported in the April Bulletin were unanimously accepted.

Treasurer:

Lenny distributed and commented on his 1999-00 proposed budget (see attachment). Although overall we have \$512 in checking and \$715 in savings, we had a deficit of \$539 last season and cannot continue at this rate for long. Two

reasons given were a decrease on banquet attendance (70 instead of 80) and a banquet speaker fee. Lenny proposed a dues increase and a decrease in the trophy cost to help get closer to a balanced budget.

There was considerable discussion on both proposals. One proposal was to require all teams to purchase 2 banquet tickets, but this was turned down. It was agreed to increase basic dues from \$40 to \$47 and increase the banquet ticket from \$19 to \$20. Therefore this year's **team dues is \$80**, and increase from \$72 last year.

Although everyone likes the quantity and quality of the trophies, it is questioned if we can continue to spend about \$1,000 per year on them. In addition to this, the supplier indicated a modest price increase. The proposed budget is for \$800. Perhaps the size can be reduced, replace metal kings with plastic ones etc. The following proposal was agreed on. For those teams that win divisional trophies and also go on to win league championship trophies, they will get one set of trophies (instead of two) but the engraved nameplate will indicate having won or placed in both categories. Of course, teams can continue the practice of purchasing additional trophies.

The proposed budget was unanimously approved (which will be corrected to show a revenue of \$100 for additional bulletins purchased, and a disbursement of \$100 for a banquet speaker fee).

Division Chairmen:

Far West-Vacant

Irwin reported that there will only 4 teams this year. Lucent will have 2 teams, with no Royals team this year. He will talk with the NW Div. to see if there is any interest in interdivisional play. Anyone interested in being the Far West Div. Chairman should contact Irwin.

Near West-Carl Reid

There are still only 4 teams in the division. Carl intends to repeat last years schedule with a multiple round robin, each playing 12 matches. He reported it worked out well last year

North-Vacant

Anyone interested in being the chairman should contact Irwin. Until then, Pat Sajbel and Art Olsen will share the duties.

This division is growing from 7 to 8 teams. The new team is the Motorola Knights and Jim Thomson is the team captain. This was approved unanimously.

Kelvin reported a new CTA team consisting of players from different terminals. Thomas Abraham is the team captain and home matches will be played at the Bank of America. The East will now have 7 teams. This was approved unanimously.

3. OTHER REPORTS:

Bulletin Editor-Ruben Reyes

The league is fortunate to have Ruben continue as the Bulletin Editor. Although Ruben uses a Macintosh, a couple of people offered help in converting PC to MAC.

Games Editor-Tom Friske, not present

Tom will continue as games editor. Again, the League is fortunate to have someone willing to do this for us. Remember to mail a copy of the games to him at 1035 E. Algonquin Road, Des Plaines, IL 60016.

Rating Chairman-Art Olsen

Art reported that our system is Y2K compliant. To help Art keep the ratings up to date and make his job easier, he needs an updated list of at least the top 8 players for new teams. Also all teams are reminded to:

- 1. Send the results sheets to him promptly. Both teams should submit the results.
- 2. Include the player's initials on the results sheet to eliminate confusion with same last names.

The members expressed their appreciation for Art providing regular rating updates e-mailed to team captains.

Publicity Chairman-David Sacks, not present Irwin believed David will continue with this activity.

Banquet Chairman-Skip Kale, not present

Carl Reid reported that Skip will continue as chairman. Last years turn out was 70 and we have to guarantee 80. There was some discussion on ways to increase participation. However, one year is not a trend and perhaps it being near a

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holiday was a significant factor. The vast majority liked the idea of a GM talk or demonstration and we will attempt to do something similar this year. This season's banquet is scheduled for June 9.

Trophy Chairman-Marty Franck

Marty was asked to try and reduce the trophy cost to \$800. This will not be easy as the individual trophy costs are expected to go up. See discussion above regarding "duplicating" team trophies.

4. ELECTIONS:

Being no changes, there was no need for any elections. However, we are still in need of chairmen for the North and Far West divisions.

5. PLAYOFFS:

The playoff is scheduled for Saturday, May 20, 2000. The site is undetermined.

6. OLD BUSINESS.

There was no new discussion on team alignment. This was essentially resolved at the last meeting.

There was a resounding approval to continue the practice of having outside club matches. Please notify Irwin if you are interested in arranging these or helping out. Otherwise Irwin will work on it.

7. NEW BUSINESS:

Please send Irwin any changes on team mailings.

Also, Division Chairmen are asked to send both Irwin and Art the names of the teams, team captains with tel. numbers so it can be published in the bulletin.

There may be interest in a knockout team tournament, a speed chess tournament or a class tournament. Anyone willing to organize one of these or serve as a TD should contact Irwin. The following proposal for a Knockout Team Tournament was proposed by Irwin:

- a. The tournament will be a 7 round double elimination knockout (first time losers go into the loser's bracket and continue playing until a 2nd loss); each team will play at least two matches; most teams will play about 4 matches.
- b. Play will proceed during the regular year, with roughly one match/month scheduled.
- c. Pairings will be based on seedings based on last year's record; pairings

- between teams in the same division will be avoided in the first round.
- d. Games will be CICL rated, but matches will not count in regular season standings.
- e. Winning team will be recognized as 1999/2000 CICL Knockout Champion.

We will try and put something together if there is enough interest. So please let your feelings be known.

For clarification, the following is the league's tie break system:

- 1) Tie breaking rules for 2-way ties (per CICL constitution)"Ties in the final standings for trophies (including 1st/2nd) and for league
 championship playoff eligibility will be settled by the following tie-break
 methods, applied in the order listed:
- a) head-to-head match score between the two teams during the regular season;
- b) head-to-head game score between the two teams during the regular season, including forfeits;
- c) Game points, including forfeits [this is presumably total game points]
- d) Sum of the match points of the opponents that the team beat, plus half of the match points of the opponents that the team tied.
- e) Formula d, substituting game points for match points"

To be added to the constitution:

2) Multiple team ties will be resolved as follows:

When there is a multiple team tie, the tie-breaking criteria are applied in order a-e but amongst all teams, NOT as individual tie-breakers between the individual teams (if you did that you could end up in the situation where team A beats team B, team B beats team C, but team C beats team A on the 2-way tiebreakers, a situation that is impossible to resolve!!). Any remaining ties proceed to the next tie breaking criteria, applied only among the teams that are still tied (so in particular if one of teams is ahead after the first tie break criteria and the other teams are still tied, the first team gets first place, and criteria b is applied to the remaining teams only)

The secretary will update our Constitution and Rules. We will include a copy in an upcoming bulletin.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:30pm.



Positioning for the attack

For an attack to succeed, pieces must be in proper position. But when positioning a piece for the attack, the opponent may also position for defense. One way to deprive the defense any opportunity to prepare countermeasures against an oncoming attack is to position pieces with check.

That's because when faced with a check, the opponent can't do anything but respond to the check either by moving the K, interposing a piece against the check, or capturing the checking piece.

Take the following illustration: (see diagram below)



White to play and win

To accomplish mate, White's 2 R's need to break away from the K such as with 1.Rb7, 2.Rbc7 and 3.Rb8#. But this takes too much time and allows Black to redeploy one of his R's to defend his back rank such as in 1.Rb7 Re6 2.Rbc7 Re8.

To enable White's two rooks to break away from the K without losing tempo, White may try the fol-


lowing:

First, check the K to force it towards the center. Then break away with one of the R's while at the same time threatening mate two ways.

Subsequently, force the Black K towards the edge of the board so as to prevent it from being able to interpose at e8 to defend against a mate.

Let's see how this works out.

1.Ref7+ Ke8 2.Rb7 (see diagram b elow)




One of White's R's breaks away, threatening mate 2 ways: 3. Rb8# and 3.Rg8#.

This forces the K towards the R at g7.

2...Kf8 3.Rxh7

(see diagram top of next column)



Again, White threatens mate two ways: 4.Rh8# and 4.Rb8#. (Note that if 4.Rgc7 then 4...Re6 5.Rc8+ Rd8 holds)

Again, Black's forced to keep in contact with one of the R's - the one at h7.

3...Kg8 4.Rhd7 (see diagram below)



Now that Black's K can't support a R at e8, White goes for mate (5.Rb8+ or 5.Rd8+). And there's no defense. If **4...Re6** then **5. Rd8+** (or 5.Rb8+) **5...Re8 6.Rxe8**# is mate.

(see diagram next page)

but at the same time captures the cpawn. And it's all done without losing tempo as mate is threatened (36.Rh8#).


So, Black's next move is forced as he has no time to retaliate with ...Rb3+ and ... Rxa3 because of the mate at h8.

36...Kg8 (see diagram below)




Now, White wins the a-pawn with tempo by repeating the pattern of checking the K to force it f8 and then breaking away with the R threatening mate while at the same time capturing the a-pawn.

37.Rcg7+ Kf8 38. Rxa7(see diagram below)



In the next illustration, the K is enticed (or forced) via a piece sacrifice into square where a player could then position a piece for attack via a check.







Black has positioned his pieces for a mate (20...Ra6#) in three quick moves without losing tempo. All because of giving checks.



The first thing that comes to mind from the diagram in the previous column is 25. Rxa6+ Kb7 (see diagram below)

Note that if the piece at a6 in the diagram above were a Q instead of a R, the position's a mate.

So, what White wants to do is to lure the Black K to the a-file.

Once Black's K has been brought to the a-file, it becomes just a matter of positioning the Q to a3 with tempo via a check. And from there to a6 for mate.

26.Ra7+! (diagram below)



Black's K is doomed.

If now 26... Kc1 then 27.Rxc7+ Qxc7 28.Qxc7# is mate.

And if 26... Kxa7, then 27.Qa3+ Kb7 28.Qa6# is mate (see diagram top of next column)

Possible solution to White to play, mate in ?:


39.Rde7+ Kd8 40,Ra7 Ke8 41,Rh7 (And there's no defense as mate is threatened two ways:42.Rh8# or 42.Ra8#, A possible ending could be 41.Ra8+ 42.Kh2 Rh1+ 43.Kxh1 any 44.Rh8# (or 44.Ra8#).

The actual game went as follows: 39.Rde7+ Kd8 40.Rb7 Kc8 41.Rxb6 Ra1+ 42.Kh2 Re1 43.Rxg6 Kb6 44.Rg6+ Re8 45.Rxe8#.



The actual game went 25.Qc4 b5 26.Qxc7+ Qxc7 27.Nxc7 Kb7 and White lost in the ensuing endgame after move 40.

Instead of a check, an attack or repetitive attacks on a valuable piece, such as a Q, can also position a piece without losing tempo. Here's an example from an actual CICL game after 31.Nd1 (see diagram below)



31...Bf5

To force the Q to e2 where Black can bring the B to g4 with tempo by an attack on the Q.


32.Qe2 Bg4 (see diagram below)



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By repetitive attacks on the Q, Black has positioned the B from the d7 square to g4 without losing a single tempo.


33.Qd3 Bxd1 1-0 (see diagram below)



If 34.Qxd1 then 34...Bxf7+ wins. Or 34.Bxd4 Qxf1+ 35.Qxf1 Rxf1+ 36. Kxf1 cxd4 wins.

What has happened here is that Black seems to have actually made two moves in a row: 1...Bg4 and 2.....Bxd1. How? By pursuing White's Q with the B.

Another but simpler example is this one from **H. da Motta** (White), 2030, of Fermilabs vs. a 1975 (Black) after **28.Bxe6 Rf8** (see diagram below)



29.Bd4!

This attack on Black's Q doesn't give Black time to defend his twice

attacked B with ...Kh7 or ...Rh6.



Finally, here's an illustration of the power of the check in the positioning of a piece without losing a single tempo.

This is from an actual game between a 2024 (White) and Kaz Jakstas (Black), 2189, of Alumni Aces after 28...Ne5 (see diagram below)



White has two pieces (R+B) to only one for Black (R) on Black's b-pawn and so wins it on 29.Bxb5.

But the problem with 29.Bxb5 is that White's B would be stuck at b5 because the moment the B leaves,

Black gobbles up White's b-pawn also with ...Rxb4. So...

29.Rxb5 (see diagram next column)



The rationale behind this capture, perhaps, is to force a R trade (29... Rxb5 30.Bxb5) because the reply 29...Nxd3 loses to 30.Rxb6.

But now comes a shocker.

29...Be3+! 1-0



Black has positioned the B (to protect the R) with check. As a result, no tempo is lost and Black's free to take the B at d3.

For if now 30.K-any, Nxd3 31. Rxb6 then 31...Bxb6 leaves Black a whole piece (a B) up.

Summary on piece positioning
A piece can be positioned with tempo (much like making two moves in a row) via:


- a check (or threat of mate) or
- an attack on a valuable piece such as the Q

In a mating attack, one can lure a K out by a piece sacrifice so piece positioning via checks allows rapid deployment of pieces.


